Our service....

Great Western
Air Ambulance Charity

GREAT Western Air Ambulance Charity (GWAAC) provide an air ambulance service for the counties of Bristol, Bath and North East Somerset, South Gloucestershire, Gloucestershire, North Somerset and parts of Wiltshire.



We are a charity to pay for the helicopter we receive **nothing** from the government or the National Lottery. That means relying entirely on the generosity of you, the neonle we serve

We are part of the regional 999 emergency response service; flying seven days a week, 365 days a year. Our helicopter is based at Filton Airport, just north of Bristol.

Flying Accident & Emergency Dept.

We use one of the best air ambulance models as we offer critical care. Put simply, it means rushing a specialist doctor and critical care paramedic to the scene; we are a flying Accident & Emergency Department. The majority of our doctors are volunteers; giving up their days off to fly with us.

Critical care means we have the ability to anesthetise patients, perform advanced medical interventions (for example chest drainage, caesarean sections etc) that are urgently needed and administer advanced pain relief which ordinary road and air ambulance paramedics are unable to do. We are able to transport to the hospital most suitable to their needs.

Yours is one of the busiest air ambulances in the UK. Please help us to keep it flying.

In numbers:

- Last year we went out on **1,544** missions
- Our costs are approximately £34,000 per week
- We cover six counties with a population of 2.1million
- We need £1.75 million a year to operate
- We are anywhere within 20 minutes of first call
- Four incidents each day need the GWAAC team

It is estimated that one in every five of our missions saves a life; that same life would be lost if we did not exist!



New Skate Park ready for next summer

Bradley Stoke Town Council is hopeful that a new concrete skate park will be ready for summer 2015. The funding for the park has been raised from various sources and young people continue to be actively involved in the design and development of the new park. Bradley Stoke Town Council are working closely with South Gloucester Council and a range of specialist surveys and reports on the new site, adjacent to the existing skate park, are nearing conclusion. It is anticipated that the tender process, to identify a specialist skate park design and construction company, will go live in October. Once a design and construction company have been appointed there will be further consultation with young people and other key stakeholders to fine tune the final design.

Over the summer holidays local young people, with the support of BSTC Youth Development & Participation Worker, have been researching other Skate Park, including two lengthy road trips and others are planned. They have so far been, along with their BMXs and Scooters, to Skate Parks in Midsomer Norton, Wincester, Newbury, Oxford and Cirencester. After riding the parks the young people have had regular meetings to critically evaluate what they have learned from the experience, both positive and negative, and to identify features and ideas that could be incorporated in our design.

Several young people are now being supported to complete the D of E Award as a consequence of their volunteering and active involvement in the planning and organisation of the two days of Skate Park related events at this years Festival, their ongoing commitment to the research and development of the new park and other ongoing contributions, including reporting on any maintenance issues at the existing Skate Park.



BSTC Youth Provision

Local Youth Work continues to develop in scope and impact as we gradually establish various projects all with an emphasis on young people having a say and their voices heard. The progress being made through supporting young people's involvement in the development of a new skate park is highlighted elsewhere in this newsletter; however, another project that has now become well established is our weekly Girls & Young Women's session every Tuesday night (7pm to 9pm) at the Jubilee Centre. Up to 20 young women aged 12 to 18 now regularly attend and engage in a range of enjoyable recreational and educational activities with the support of female youth workers. Some of the following comments demonstrate the benefit of the sessions, "the group is a fantastic place to come and the youth workers are easy to talk to" (14yrs), "I have made some really good friends and feel more confident at school as I know some of the older girls..." (13yrs). New members are always welcome, just come along or see contact details below for further info.

Two young people's residentials are taking place in North Devon during October. With the support of Youth Workers young people will participate in a range of team building and challenging activities and have a chance to put down those game consoles and step outside their comfort zones.

Regular Detached/ Street-based youth work sessions continue, including Thursday nights at the Jubilee Centre hard courts (6.30 to 9pm). The Thursday sessions have a football focus and young people are currently planning to organise some regular fixtures against other teams. The sessions also provide the opportunity for young people to talk about things important to them, plan other youth activities and have access to youth workers offering support on a range of issues.

The above are examples of some current youth work projects being supported by Bradley Stokes Youth Development and Participation Worker. Here are some more comments by young people about the various projects, "it good to have our own say" (18 yrs), "our involvement in the festival helped get parents and older people to understand what we're doing and to get on our side" (17 yrs), "it's good to have workers who value our opinion" (17 yrs)

The above youth work projects and other opportunities for young people to get involved are promoted through regular work in the school and also through work with various local youth groups and other agencies and through street- based/ detached youth work sessions.



Bradley Stoke Carnival 2014

The second Bradley Stoke Carnival took place this year on Saturday the 23rd of August.

From the outset, the aim of the carnival was to provide a community oriented, family friendly event and having built on the successes from last year, the newly formed carnival committee (made up predominately by members of our local community) got together to create an event that the community could be involved in on many levels.

An international theme was chosen, which the committee hoped would reflect the diversity of cultures that make up our town, and this indeed proved to be the case when the long awaited day finally arrived.

The day started with an internationally themed parade which far exceeded all our expectations. We were anticipating around one hundred entries, but on the day itself the parade exceeded two hundred people all dressed in spectacular costumes and including local groups as well as individuals. The parade was led by Cllr Matthew Riddle (SGC) who was accompanied by local Cllrs Tom Aditya and Brian Hopkinson plus a 9ft high stilt walker and a circus juggler.

The carnival parade's rhythm was provided by twelve very loud Indian drummers plus the occasional blast from the Free Wheelers motorcycle blues and twos. It was a very colourful and noisy affair as it processed along Brook Way being met by local residents wondering what all the noise was about!

On arrival at the field prizes were presented to those judged to have the best costumes in the parade, trophies were handed out by our Town Mayor Cllr John Ashe and Cllr Matthew Riddle.

The Jubilee Green itself played host to the Carnival for the day and hot air balloons launched at 7am as a precursor of the day ahead. Many local community groups had stalls and demonstrations from local groups took place in a demonstration area hosted by Bradley Stoke Radio. An outstanding display of classic and kit cars arrived en masse and just about squeezed on to the field. Live music was a large part of the day with five acts taking to the stage as the afternoon went on and despite a torrential downpour spirits were not dampened as the headline act, the Twerzels (Wurzels Tribute band) took to the stage to entertain us all with some Scrumpy and western. It was really pleasing to see so many people just enjoying themselves and dancing away to all the favourite Wurzels hits.

Local talent featured highly in the music line up with performances from Dave Hariss, Mia and Tuesday Eagle, Spin Sister and to close the event Sam's Band (a four piece show band with awesome sounds loved by all present).

One of the highlights of the day was a vintage 1950's bus that ran a free service around the north of the town throughout the afternoon and judging by the smiling faces it was more than likely a first for a lot of residents, both young and old! It really was strange seeing a red London routemaster bus driving around Bradley Stoke and some of the looks from the First bus drivers coming the other way were priceless!

The funfair was enjoyed by many again this year and featured a new umbrella ride as well as the usual assortment of rides and sideshows.

The day was, as the Carnival Committee hoped it would be, a testament to our wonderful diverse local community and it was lovely to see people setting out their picnics with all the family young and older and simply enjoying the day, even if it was necessary to deploy the occasional umbrella.



The South West Winterguard Academy

The South West Winterguard Academy are very proud to announce that in 2014 they became the Winterguard UK Cadet Champions in Stoke. They won with their performance of the Grufalo, their Juniors achieved a 3rd place and their A Class 5th.

The non profit making community youth group run by volunteers formed 4 years ago and competes within the UK Winterguard competitions for ages 8-21. Its dedicated to providing a quality educational and performance programme centred on music and movement. The dance is based using flags and other equipment to perform a routine to music where children and young adults can express their movement and style to others.

They had a busy Summer fund raising and taking part in local Community Fetes and Festivals all over the district, including our very own Bradley Stoke Festival and Carnival inspiring young people to take part in any sporting activity and keep active in the community.

Could you provide a loving home?

With about 100 children and young people coming into care each year in South Gloucestershire, we need more families to help look after them at this potentially vulnerable time in their lives. Children come into care for many different reasons. Some may have experienced a family crisis and coming into care is the only option for them.

However, nationally there is a shortage of people coming forward to foster older children and young people, and we are looking for people who have the time, energy (and room) to give a young person who needs a loving home. Our foster carers are people of all ages and backgrounds, and we welcome people from all walks of life.

Every child or young person who comes into care needs a home with a loving family where they can feel cared for and safe and where they have someone to listen to them. Caring for someone during a vulnerable period in their lives can be one of the most rewarding opportunities anyone can give.

To ensure the welfare of our children and carers is paramount, we provide training and support, as well as financial support to ensure our carers can provide the care and attention a young person needs.

If you would like to help care for a young person but don't feel you can offer the commitment of fostering, then you might like to consider offering short breaks for disabled children and young people. To become a short break carer you need to be able to care for a disabled child or young person in your home for a minimum of one weekend a month. This can increase if you feel able to offer more regular visits.

Short break care (called Share the Care) allows carers to develop long term relationships with the child they are looking after, and their family and suits people who can offer short break care.

Do you care about your community? Do you want to be heard and get things done?

Then why not come along to the next Safer Stronger Community Group (SSCG) meeting your area? SSCGs influence how services are delivered locally, establish longer-term plans to improve areas, help prevent future problems, and deal with current local issues.

There are 20 Safer Stronger Community Groups across South Gloucestershire for residents to attend and raise local issues that concern them. They can give their views on possible improvements to further strengthen their communities and keep these safe places to live and work.

The meetings are also attended by partner agencies, including South Gloucestershire Council, Avon and Somerset Police, Avon Fire and Rescue Service, NHS South Gloucestershire, Town and Parish Councils and other local organisations. These organisations work together on the issues raised and often involve the community in implementing solutions.

Some of the issues raised and tackled have included creating positive activities for young people, anti-social behaviour, school crossing concerns, speeding and parking. Community grants through the Safer Stronger Communities Initiative Fund have helped support initiatives raised at the meetings, such as Community Speedwatch groups, community garden work, youth engagement activities, park improvements, activities for older people, and equipment for walking buses to schools.
