## Young people "at the heart" of new Skate Park for Bradley Stoke.

Progress continues to be made with the design and proposed build of a new skate park for Bradley Stoke. Just seventeen months after identifying a new location for the park, plans are reaching an advanced stage with the shortlisting of initial designs and tenders from several skate park companies.

Rapid progress has been made and young people have been key to every stage of the development of the new park. Bradley Stoke Town Council have bought into the principal outlined in the national document Positive for Youth (2011);

"Involving young people does not only lead to better decisions and a greater sense of ownership by young people... It also sends a clear message about the valued and positive place of young people in their community".

Through local youth work, young people initially identified a new skate park as a priority and with the support of the BSTC Youth Development and Participation Worker have continued to be involved at all stages, including planning, design, fundraising, establishing key requirements, meeting with potential contractors and now the detailed evaluation of tender submissions from skate park companies.

Key decisions have been made by a BSTC skate park working group with local town councillors, young people, the BSTC youth worker and others working closely together in partnership.

At a recent meeting the young people said that "we feel we have been at the heart of decision making"; "we are part of making major decisions"; "we have been kept informed and had a say in all key decisions".

Two of the councillors involved in the working group said: "The input from the young people has been invaluable to ensure that we are providing the best suited design ... at the consultation day both the users and tenderers found that exploring all ideas and suggestions enabled high quality bids to be submitted. The input from the young people has without fail been structured, thoughtful and balanced".

"Having [young people's] support at all the stages in the new skate parks development has been key ... but also more recently in the vitally important design and tendering phases of the project, they have really been a major driving force ... It's been a real pleasure working alongside the youth team".

A skate park company will be selected by the end of January and then a period of further consultation will take place to fine tune the design. It is now anticipated that the new park will be completed by the end of September 2015.

# Leisure Equipment on The Jubilee Green – Consultation

Bradley Stoke Town Council is considering installing a range of leisure equipment for public use on the Jubilee Green (subject to obtaining grant funding from external sources). Below we have identified a range of pieces of equipment which could be installed and are interested in hearing residents views/preferences.

#### **Air Walker**

This universally popular apparatus provides excellent cardiovascular exercise while developing the leg muscles. Allows a full range of movement in the hip joint improving flexibility and strength, without any impact or stress to joints and back. Suitable for all ages and especially for those for whom jogging and power walking are not suitable.as an event and has been entered in their national competition. We had a lot of compliments about the hotel and it has quickly become a focal point of interest for primary school children & already we've been asked to help make others. Ours is suitable for hedgehogs, frogs, bees, butterflies and of course bugs! The top has been planted with bee friendly plants. Beacon Playscheme -

## **Chest Press/Seated Row**

The Chest Press/Seated Row is an upper body double station that gives users a fantastic workout as well as saving space, giving two exercises for the price of one. Based on lifting approximately 30% of your body weight, this machine works the chest and arms on one side and the arms and back on the other, giving a great upper body workout for all abilities.

### **Cross Trainer**

The Cross Trainer is designed to give a cardiovascular workout, as well as improving muscle tone in the legs and arms.

## **Dips/Leg Raise**

This piece of equipment is two exercises for the price and space of one. The Dips/Leg Raise has an improved Dips exercise on one side and the more inclusive Leg Raise exercise on the other side. The Leg Raise exercises are an excellent way to improve your core strength. The Dips exercises are for the fitness fanatic who will visit the gym especially to use this strength piece. The Dips improves the strength and tone of the upper body, in particular arms and shoulders.

### **Hand Bike**

The Hand Bike can be used by both able bodied users and wheelchair users. It is an excellent cardiovascular piece of equipment, toning up arms whilst improving muscle, stamina and endurance.

#### **Hip Twister**

This gentle exerciser is designed to improve flexibility and range of movement of hips and waist. Good for warm-up and cool down routines and for toning obliques. Three people can exercise together, and the unstrenuous nature of this exercise allows for social interaction. Suitable for all ages.

### Lat Pull Down/Shoulder Press

The Lat Pull Down and Shoulder Press offer two exercises for the price of one Based on lifting approximately 30% of the users body weight, this machine works the shoulders and arms on one side and the arms and back on the other, giving a great upper body workout for all abilities.

### Leg Press/Bench

This double unit is good for a wide range of Tone activities. The Leg Press works leg and calf muscles under a controlled plane, with feet fixed onto the designated footplate. The Bench can be used for a number of exercise variations, not just limited to sit ups. The bars around the edge enables the user to perform incline press ups and tricep dips and the bench caters for a wide variety of sit up and abdominal crunch exercises.

## **Pull Up/Assisted Pull Up**

This double station caters for the super fit user as well as those new to exercise. On one side there is a full Pull Up station for the very fit user. The other side is an Assisted Pull Up. By stepping on the platform, the users' own body weight is counter-levered to enable them to perform the equivalent of a 50% pull up.

## **Plyometric Boxes/Step Up**

Plyometric boxes and Step Ups. Great for the super-fit to the new user, giving an excellent cardiovascular workout, improving heart and lung function, as well as improving leg strength and overall tone.

### **Recumbent Bike**

Designed to give the user a cardiovascular workout and improve leg strength and muscle tone. The Recumbent Bike is ideal as a rehabilitation tool, keeping the back in a fixed position whilst working the lower body.

### **Ski Trainer**

This low impact piece is a real hit with everyone - beginners to exercise through to elite athletes. The Ski Machine is a cardiovascular piece which works the upper and lower body simultaneously. It is also great for warm up and cool down exercise.

## **Spinning Bike**

The Spinning Bike is a classic machine for any gym. This cardiovascular piece of equipment works the lower body as well as heart and lungs.

### **Treadmill/Oblique**

This double unit is good for gentler cardio activity. It includes a Treadmill that uses a roller system set at a 3 degree incline to give the user the ability to jog or walk depending on their level of fitness.

# Other Pieces of Equipment Suggested include:

#### **Boules/Petanque Court**

A flat/levelled surface (adequately drained) to enable residents/ families to play boules/petanque

### **Table Tennis Table**

Outdoor table tennis table with rounded corners for extra safety. The net is moulded into the 85mm thick table top. The dimensions are  $274 \times 152 \times 90$  cm (including net) and the table top height is 76 cm from the floor.

## Bouncing Babies Report December 2014

### Rationale

Bouncing Babies was originally set up to help reduce the high levels of post natal depression identified in the area by local health professionals. There is an on-going need to support isolated mums with their children, particularly during the first 12 months. During this time, it is also important that parent and child form strong bonds to prevent issues of attachment in later childhood.

Bouncing Babies runs every Tuesday at the Jubilee Centre, Bradley Stoke, 1-3pm.

#### Aims

To provide weekly group support and activities to parents and their infants living in the Bradley Stoke area

#### **Objectives**

- Reduce the risk factors associated with post natal depression
- Provide networking opportunities for parents
- Support the bonding process between parent and child
- To highlight the importance of play and its role in child
  - evelopment
- To provide relevant information and advice as appropriate
- To promote difference and prevent isolation

Health visitors have limited time and budget cuts have meant the closure of clinics, Sure Start centres and Anti natal classes. This group provides a first point of support for new parents.



we have a wide variety of nationalities attending French, Polish, German, Indian, Malaysian, South African, Australian, Chinese showing that Bradley Stoke is a multi-cultural town. Such a wide variety of cultures and traditions brings knowledge and interest to the group.

Since last year, we have been able to strengthen our links with local health professionals and we have promoted the group to the Health & Social Care Team who have made subsequent referrals to the group. The group also features in a new promotional DVD celebrating the work of Southern Brooks. A few of the women give some insightful interviews into the importance of the group for them and their family.

Bouncing Babies remains the only group specifically for families with children under one years of age.

We have had contact with 132 different families this year. With over 100 of those families living in Bradley Stoke. However, we also have families from Little Stoke, Patchway, Stoke Gifford, Frenchay, Filton and Yate.

This year we were successful in securing additional funding from the Health Inequalities grants as they recognised the important role this group plays in promoting positive mental health in isolated new mums and we also received a donation of £50 from ASDA. The group is extremely grateful to Bradley Stoke Town Council for funding this group as without their contribution this important group would be unable to run.

He also made special mention of Margaret Durlacher's contribution to the Club, which was way beyond her duties as outgoing treasurer. Then why not come along to the next Safer Stronger Community Group (SSCG) meeting your area? SSCGs influence how services are delivered locally, establish longerterm plans to improve areas, help prevent future problems, and deal with current local issues.

There are 20 Safer Stronger Community Groups across South Gloucestershire for residents to attend and raise local issues that concern them. They can give their views on possible improvements to further strengthen their communities and keep these safe places to live and work.

The meetings are also attended by partner agencies, including South Gloucestershire Council, Avon and Somerset Police, Avon Fire and Rescue Service, NHS South Gloucestershire, Town and Parish Councils and other local organisations. These organisations work together on the issues raised and often involve the community in implementing solutions.

Some of the issues raised and tackled have included creating positive activities for young people, anti-social behaviour, school crossing concerns, speeding and parking. Community grants through the Safer Stronger Communities Initiative Fund have helped support initiatives raised at the meetings, such as Community Speedwatch groups, community garden work, youth engagement activities, park improvements, activities for older people, and equipment for walking buses to schools.
