We are the UK's leading charity dedicated to conquering stroke. We provide vital services, campaign for better stroke care and invest in research to find better treatments, sooner.

There are 1.2 million stroke survivors in the UK with 100,000 strokes happening in the UK each year. That's one stroke every five minutes. Even though you are now twice as likely to survive a stroke compared to 20 years ago, stroke is still the fourth single largest cause of death in the UK. We know we need to change how people think about stroke and challenge the myths surrounding it. We push for greater awareness of stroke and its warning signs and campaign for better stroke care. We believe strokes can and should be prevented. We believe everyone has the right to make the best recovery they can after stroke. We believe research has the power to save lives and ensure people make the best recovery they can. Our research has helped to improve treatments and care which has saved thousands of lives, including ground breaking progress in providing mechanical thrombectomies to reverse the effects of a stroke. Our support services have helped hundreds of thousands of people get through one of the most frightening experiences of their lives and build a life after stroke.

Our Helpline is available to all stroke survivors and their families to answer questions, provide advice and sometimes just a listening ear. Our Life After Stroke grants help make simple but life-changing adjustments, from installing a chair lift or providing gym membership they really do make all the difference. Our stroke clubs and groups across the country provide face to face peer support in the most challenging and darkest times for a stroke survivor. Our campaigning has touched the lives of even more people through initiatives like the FAST campaign, making more people aware of the signs of a stroke and the importance of taking emergency action.

Together we can conquer stroke.



The West of England MS Therapy Centre Soon to be



The Centre was established as a registered charity in 1985. Initially set up by Jackie Brightwell in a small industrial unit in Nailsea it grew over time so that in January 2012 the Centre moved into a larger bespoke building in Bradley Stoke, South Gloucestershire, less than 5 minutes from the M5/M4 interchange.

We provide **treatments**, **therapies and support** to people living with **neurological conditions**, including Multiple Sclerosis, in a caring, friendly and professional environment. We are the only Therapy Centre open to people on a self-referral basis and cover South Gloucestershire, North Somerset, North East Somerset, Bristol, BANES, and South Wales.

Our aim is to **support** people with neurological conditions so that they can **remain independent and active** for as long as possible. Whilst there is **no cure** for many of the conditions we treat the therapies and social support we offer helps individuals to **cope better** with the day-to-day challenges they face.

We are bolstered by a huge team of **Volunteers**. Our Oxygen Treatment department has 20 regular volunteers who operate to keep the oxygen chamber running full-time. Volunteers help across the board from administration to running the Carer's Support Group. We've estimated that the Charity and members benefit from **751 volunteer hours every month!**

Our Therapies

The Centre's main therapies are physiotherapy, exercise classes and oxygen treatment. In recent years there have been increases in group physiotherapy and individuals using the gym. This has been a strategy implemented by the Centre to enable larger numbers of people to benefit from the Centre's physiotherapy expertise and equipment.



We have a dedicated team of professional therapists providing Acupuncture, Reflexology, Aromatherapy, Foot Health, Beauty Treatments, Counselling, Hypnotherapy and Talking Therapies.

We hold specialised clinics for Bladder and Bowel Wellness, Spasticity Management, MS Nurse Advice Clinic and Employment and Benefits Advice.

Our Members

We support on average in excess of **300 people** every year. Our largest group of people by far are those with Multiple Sclerosis (70%). Many **symptoms of MS**, particularly fatigue, brain fog and issues with balance **overlap with other neurological conditions** such as fibromyalgia, CFS/ME, and Stroke and our therapies benefit people with all these conditions.

In the absence of alternative affordable services that include **physiotherapy and oxygen treatment** for people with many similar symptoms to MS, the Centre opened its doors to anyone with a long term neurological condition that would benefit.

We want to continue to offer services and treatments to a growing number of people who need long term specialist support. It costs IRO £380,000 each year to keep the Centre open and we can only do this with the help of our generous supporters.

What Becky says about the Centre



"The MS Centre is invaluable. I attend the exercise class in the gym. I enjoy exercising with others without feeling judged. With the physio's expertise, encouragement and support my mobility has improved a little and I feel more confident in what I am able to do.

The best therapy for me at the moment is Oxygen Treatment. This significantly lightens my fatigue and has amazing, positive effects on all my other MS symptoms.

I can no longer play my once adored violin but the boost I get from the Centre and the camaraderie from other Members is so beneficial to me.

This, combination is what keeps me positive! I find all the staff really welcoming, upbeat and caring and I always leave the Centre with a smile."

Bradley Stoke Community Festival 2018

Friday 08 June

The first day of the Festival involved the Parents & Pre-school children enjoying the Picnic in the Park on the Jubilee Green. Professor Panic providing magic and circus skills shows for school parties, as they had done the previous day as well as for the pre-schoolers during the morning and early afternoon. Face painting, a bouncy castle, music and commentary from Bradley Stoke Radio provided additional entertainment for the children with cakes, snacks and refreshments provided by the Heartful Dodgers charity.

Saturday 09 June

The main day was a beautiful sunny and windless day and kicked off with the annual Bradley Stoke Football Tournament for Year 1 Boys and Girls which was again well attended with over 140, enthusiastic children taking part.

The music and dance programme on the football pitch side started with a lovely solo performance by Rose Bruford of Bradley Stoke Community School, followed by the excellent Marc Hopkins tribute to Robbie Williams and local bands; Limited Edition and Angel Heart with an enjoyable tribute to the Gypsy Kings by the Andaluce Quartet and concluded with the very different and unique sound of the Rock Pipes band.

In between the bands local talented children, some as young as 3, provided really enthusiastic dance displays, the dance groups included; Baby Ballet, Danceworks, Street Envy, Stoke Gifford and Kirsty Husher Schools of Dance and an enthusiastic paint throwing dance by SGAP with the audience invited to join in — a fun and very colourful display.

The area had a small range of stalls as well as the impressive backdrop of the very popular Noah's Ark and Helter-skelter inflatables. The Churches again did a roaring trade with their teas and cakes alongside the Bradley Stoke Scouts Group who provided a range of activities, including longbow archery and the popular Vertical Extreme climbing wall.

On the Jubilee Green, Bradley Stoke Town Council youth workers & young volunteers organised the returning popular combination of the Skate half-pipe, (provided by King Ramps) and Street Art, courtesy of Paintsmiths. The half-pipe accommodated displays by the pro's, coupled with the chance for festival goers to "have a go" on their skate boards, bikes and scooters. Alongside, some amazing Art works were created and over 70 boards being completed and proudly taken home for display as well as young people contributing to a large Art wall. Individual displays by St Mary's Rugby Club and Dragon Sang Doo provided activities alongside the very popular Community zone rides involving a Rodeo Bull, Wipe out and Bungee Run which was sponsored by the Bradley Stoke Town Council and although free to participants raised over £380 in donations. New for 2018 a children's go-karts ride and football skills stall added to the participation activities which included bungee trampolines, giant slides and inflatables.

The Bazaar Marquee, although a popular facility for stall holders without a gazebo, didn't prove popular with the inside being very warm for both visitors and the stall holders themselves. Over 80 stalls were outside in the Jubilee Green area though and most mentioned they had had a very good day with the ice cream and drinks vendors doing particularly well.

Sunday 10 June

The good weather continued into the Sunday and the popular 10k Run, organised by Sole Sisters, was another resounding success with over 600 runners taking part from the Jubilee Centre. A very well organised race enjoyed by the runners and those watching!

The church service followed the race this year at 11.45 and proved very popular and a very enjoyable service was provided by the 3 churches with people coming from all over the area to join in.

At Baileys Court Activity Centre, the afternoon cricket was an Under 11's match with 4 local teams taking part and all players being awarded commemorative medals sponsored by the Town Council. Bradley Stoke Cricket Club provided further entertainment throughout the afternoon with the local Bradley Stoke Bowls Club providing roll ups for people throughout the afternoon.

Meanwhile over 250 people attended the annual festival Skate Competition, organised by the Town Councils youth work staff and young volunteers and with competitions in Scooter, BMX and Skateboard categories. The half-pipe was relocated from Jubilee Green, to offer extra capacity, and a Circus Skills workshop provided an added attraction. Occasional pro rider demos were spaced throughout the afternoon, including displays from Jack Clark from the British BMX Olympic Team.

This year's festival was again a very well attended exceeding the 2017 attendance boosted by the lovely warm and sunny weather and raised over £3,800 in donations from suppliers and stall holders to the Mayor's chosen charities.



Bradley Stoke Youth Club - Football Festival





On Saturday 9th June 2018, Bradley Stoke Youth FC continued the success of their Football Festival at the Jubilee Centre which attracted 130 School children (Year 1) representing 13 different local schools. The Festival is the culmination of the School Link Program where BSYFC FA Qualified coaches go into the 13 schools and provide football coaching to all Year 1 children over a 3 week period. The program starts in February and finishes in May ready for the Festival in June. The Football Festival has been running since 2006 and over the years has developed into a major part of the Bradley Stoke Town Community Festival. To date, over 1,750 children have now taken part. The School Link Program started in 2007 and has grown over the years to a major community activity with over 7,500 children having received football skills coaching in their school. The Festival and the School Link Program is free of charge to all schools, and the Festival provides an opportunity for children to play games of non-competitive football in a safe environment. Each school receives a cup which can be kept for a year, and is awarded on a points-scoring system based on things such as; attitude and approach of players and teachers, preparation and organisation, adhering to the guidelines and ensuring both boys and girls of all abilities are selected. The whole day is about participation and enjoyment to allow each child the opportunity to play football in a friendly environment. Every child receives a medal and gift bag full of football related essentials like shin pads, football socks, water bottle, baseball cap, activity play pack and sweets. As well as the cup, each school receives a bag of size 3 footballs to continue the football coaching at their school. The winning school also receives a new kit for their team.

The Teacher Awards this year went to Bowsland Green and St Michaels.

Community Festival - Youth Activities

BSTC Youth Work Festival weekend update:

On the Saturday BSTC youth workers & young volunteers organised the return to Jubilee Green of the popular combination of a large portable Skate half-pipe (provided by King Ramps) and Street Art workshops (courtesy of Paintsmiths). The half-pipe accommodated displays by the pro's, coupled with the chance for festival goers to "have a go" on their skate boards, bikes and scooters. Alongside the half-pipe, queues of young festival goers started to build, waiting to create some amazing Art works. Over 70 individual works of art were completed on 4ft x 2ft boards and then proudly taken home for display; in addition, children and young people contributing to a large Art wall. Throughout the day youth workers were on hand to discuss and promote other current and planned youth work activities.

On Sunday at the Skatepark, over 250 people attended the annual festival Skate Jam with competitions in Scooter, BMX and Skateboard categories. The half-pipe was relocated from Jubilee Green, to offer extra capacity, and a Circus Skills workshop provided an added attraction. As on Saturday, there were several pro rider demos spaced throughout the afternoon, including spectacular displays from Jack Clark from the British BMX Freestyle Team (now an Olympic sport). Young people were not only instrumental in helping to plan and deliver the two days of activities but were also heavily involved in documenting both days and promoting them through social media.

Lots of young people and parents were appreciative of the two days, saying the skate comp "was a great day"; "thanks for a well organised event" and "the displays were amazing". The Saturday Art workshops were also highly regarded with parents saying, "we'd love to see more opportunities like this" and "this is something a bit different".

Each team played each other once with a final two play-off matches to decide finishing positions. The first matches got on the way as the sun came out. Each player bowled one over and batted one over with 8 overs in total for each innings. The scoring of Kwik Cricket differs to that of the conventional game, in that each team starts on 200 runs and loses 5 runs for each wicket conceded, so it can all change very quickly. After the first match everyone enjoyed the BBQ and refreshments, kindly cooked by Sam, Jason, Shabaz and Andy. The rest of the afternoon saw everyone get more confident with the bat and lots of 4's and 6s were being hit. The final game finished at around 5pm after which every child was presented with a medal to remember the day. The winning team was Stapleton Cricket Club who were presented with a Trophy. Bradley Stoke 10k Run 2018

Sole Sisters hosted the Bradley Stoke 10k for the twelfth consecutive year. In record time all 650 entries sold out within three weeks of opening so much so that the race did not need to be advertised locally as in previous years. The extremely well led committee, chaired by Sam Carpenter, ran the event with military precision. The six months of planning, regular meetings and nominated tasks all came together on the day. The 10k committee consists entirely of volunteer Sole Sisters members who all arrived at 6am to start setting up the HQ and erecting the 'on the day' signs. Six lead marshals gathered their own group of mile marshals all equipped with goodie bags to keep them going throughout the event - 90 marshal points including two water stations are manned around the course. 566 runners completed the course this year, thankfully no injuries were reported and no paramedic attention was required. The race started at 9:30am by the new mayor with the first competitor completing the course in 32 minutes. The last competitor completed in a time of 1:29. After the prize giving, Sole Sisters club members dismantled

the event and were fully cleared away and leaving the venue by 11:30am which is quite phenomenal. Sole Sisters will be donating £1 per runner to Charity in memory of one of our Sisters Dr Becky Mitchell who very sadly passed away in April seven months after a horrific traffic accident. Dr Becky Mitchell used to raise funds for Children's Hospice South West charity and her mum has asked that we donate the money to this charity in her honour.

Working in partnership with local councils, businesses and service charities, we aim to enhance the implementation of the community covenant in our local area. Specifically

- Perform reviews with stakeholders to ensure on-going support requirements are sustainably fulfilled and plans are in place for necessary improvement to delivery if required
- Help develop and maintain support relationships among stakeholders, which facilitate the achievement of short and long terms veterans support goals locally.

The Community Covenant is not just about the Government delivering commitments on a national level. Future projects include: the MS Therapy Centre Garden & the Armistice Day Centenary Poppy Gardens




The Common East - More good news

MeetingsAs well as Full Council, there are three Standing Committees for Planning & Environment, Finance, Leisure, Youth and Amenities. All Council and Standing Committee meetings are open to the public and the press. At any of the meetings there is time for electors to ask questions during public question time. Times and dates of meetings are published on the Town Council Noticeboards and on the Town Council Web Site.

Grant Aid

Bradley Stoke Town Council has allocated a sum of money each year for grant aid to be awarded for small projects that benefit the local community (maximum grant is £500.00). All applications are considered on their merits. Application forms may be obtained from the BSTC Office. Grant Aid is only available to organisations and not individuals. There is also a Community Development Grant Funding budget available for bigger projects (maximum grant £4,000).
